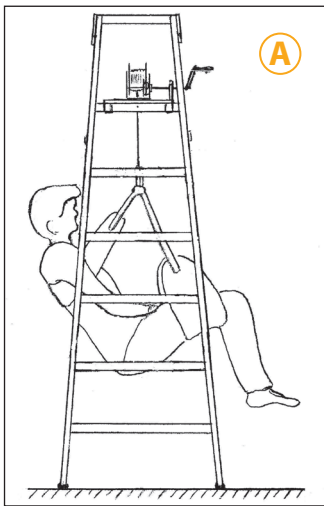


# LaddaLift™

The easy-to-use home lift for the fallen

## THE PROBLEM:

More than 1 in 3 people aged 65 and over fall each year. And younger people with circulatory problems, MS, or CP, for example, also have a high risk of falling. A single caregiver is unlikely to be able to lift the fallen to a chair or bed. Although some home lifts are available, they are usually affixed to the ceiling or wall, so can't be moved, and are bulky and costly

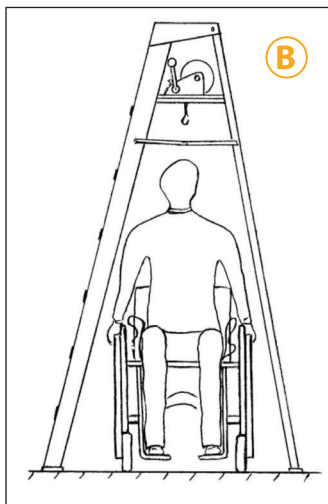


## THE SOLUTION: THE LADDALIFT

The LaddaLift uses a special stepladder - fully usable as such - quickly retrofitted with a winch and sling to form a household lift for the fallen. It can be used almost anywhere in the home or yard, enabling almost anyone, even a young teenager, to lift a fallen person.

## HOW IT WORKS:

1. The helper gets the fabric sling arranged under the person on the floor.
2. The ladder is then brought alongside, the winch set on board, and the ladder set over the fallen person.
3. The cable is extended down and attached to the sling.
4. The person is easily cranked up above chair height (image A).
5. A wheelchair is rolled under, person is lowered (image B).



## FEATURES:

- » Stores away compactly
- » Winch stores nearby (Could be electric)
- » Dual use: as stepladder or as emergency lift
- » Fraction of the cost of traditional patient lift
- » Tested: lifts a 250lbs, 6'-4" man
