One Hander Roller Pin

Baking made easy

THE PROBLEM:


The common household rolling pin is useless for those having just one usable hand. As well, for those who cannot stand, two-handed rolling pins used while seated are cumbersome and difficult to push down to roll dough well.

There are special rolling pins built like paint rollers for one-handed use, but these pose difficulties for those with poor dexterity or weak hands and arms. While seated, they do not provide enough force to roll dough effectively.



THE SOLUTION: KPC'S ONE-HANDER ROLLING PIN

KPC's One-Hander gives the user one-handed control, yet with greater force than traditional rolling pins thanks to the two-roller system design. It rolls dough faster and more efficiently as dough stays flat and does not snap back. It is portable and light, and can be used while seated.



HOW IT WORKS:

Flatten dough slightly, grab the handle, start rolling dough.

Or, for those that can't grip well, KPC designed a semi-rigid mitten-like "dock", enabling the user to insert an open hand without needing to grip anything. The hand is lower and the rollers closer together, maintaining stability while rolling dough more effectively.
